

## **BACKGROUND INFO**

After three decades in which graffiti, street art and skateboarding have been regarded as fringe activities, in recent years they have become central to debates about the social, political and legal aspects of contemporary urban practices.

The 'street' aesthetic is widely used to signify youth and urban cultures and is featured as a backdrop for fashion shoots, music videos and television drama. Graffiti and street art have been recognized in commentary about political protests in the Middle East. In the art market, the works of graffiti writers and street artists are valued by collectors and major museums. The National Gallery of Australia and the Tate Modern in London, among others, have staged major exhibitions featuring graffiti and street art. Despite this mainstream presence, the legal status of urban interventions such as graffiti, street art and skateboarding is still precarious — marking walls is illegal unless done with the permission of the property owner and skateboarding is regarded as trespass or nuisance unless it takes place within permitted areas.

Our primary objective to bring together a range of people—academics, artists, architects, critics, collectors, public servants—who have similar interests in questions of street art, urban character, and public cultures, and to develop a deeper understanding of these issues and their impact on our experience and interpretation of pubic spaces and contemporary cities.
